My Dear Cousin Fannie:

I think from what I can understand from letters received from Mrs. S. E. Collier and also James J. Collier that I have correctly named you as my Cousin, as you would be my Father's first Cousin were he living.

I have been endeavoring for a good many years to locate my Grandfather's brother's family that moved to Texas in 1857 and I sent your Sister in law, Mrs. I.C. Collier, a copy of a letter I wrote Mrs. S. E. Collier, your other Sister in law, of Waco, Texas. in order that you may know just what I was writing. I would be glad to hear from you giving me the information requested.

Mr. J.T. Blalock was the gentleman that gave me the information regarding your Father's family. I had been trying since the death of my Father, Isaac Cuthbert Collier, in 1908 to locate just where your family was in Texas. I had written many Colliers in that State. I hope some day to see you and know you personally. My Grandfather, Robert Marshall Collier when he died in 1896 was about 82 years old and during his time was one of the largest cotton planters in the State of Georgia and at the time of his death had some thirty or forty plantations. He had a very large family born to him but several of them died during the Civil War, some in infancy, his oldest boy, Robert Thomas was killed in the Civil War and he lost some four or five children after the Civil War, two of them when they were infants etc. After I hear from you I will write you a complete letter of his family. I am attaching herewith carbon copy of letter I have just written to your Sister in law, which will apply to you also and will also apply to your Sister in law you live with, Mrs. Isaac Cobb Collier.
